In this interactive workshop, faculty can infuse their expertise with the Appreciative Advising framework to create a personalized advising toolkit to meet students where they are and develop a strong foundation for achieving their goals.

PD #1: "Transparency in Learning & Teaching (TiLT) Workshop"

This means, for our students, clear expectations, understanding, and communication for success (and how to earn a specific grade).

Purpose of the Workshop

Assignments Matter: This interactive workshop brings faculty together to work on how to be more transparent with our students when developing assignments. This will focus on how and why our students are learning course content, concepts, and skills in a particular way, how it can motivate them, and how they will use that learning in their lives after college.

As participants in this session, you will engage with others while using one of your current assignments as an example: You will need to bring a current assignment you are using in your class now (un-TILTed), then you will partner up with another participant. You will charrette with your partner: a collaborative, collegial process that helps educators revisit and revise their assignments with peers. The partner participant should be of a different academic area if possible. Then you will read each other's assignments, each having the opportunity to ask questions about the assignment you have just read. Charrettes foster a culture of pedagogical appreciation and offer a space for giving and receiving feedback that is both rigorous and supportive. Then the TILTed version can start to take form as the participants leave with ideas, inspiration, and strategies to make their assignments more transparent. You will learn that TILTing has been found to increase academic confidence, create a sense of belonging, and improve skills valued by employers. Longitudinal studies also show improvements in retention rates and GPA.

PD #2: "Motivating and Engaging Learners: HITS and GPS Mindset"

The LA Board of Regents reports that more than 25% of college students in Louisiana who fail courses do so because they stop attending. So, what can we do as faculty to keep students engaged and motivated in our courses? This workshop introduces two approaches that aim to do just that. High-Impact Teaching Strategies (HITS) focus on active learning strategies to engage students and enhance the learning experience. Evidence shows that utilizing HITS increases student attainment of learning outcomes and critical thinking skills. The GPS Mindset is an approach based on motivational research that aims to engage students in their own learning experiences by developing within them a Growth mindset, an understanding of Purpose and relevance of coursework, and a Sense of belonging. In addition to an overview of these approaches, workshop attendees will learn specific and practical techniques that they can implement in their own courses.

PD #3: "Interdisciplinary Collaboration – CREATE and FDCs"

Are you interested in collaborating with other faculty on fun, interesting, and productive projects? Join this session to learn about two opportunities you have for the 2025-2026 academic year. Get involved and experience the engagement that will make your year more meaningful and enjoyable!

<u>CREATE</u> — The <u>Center for Research, Education</u>, and <u>Artistic Teamwork Exploration</u> (CREATE) is a faculty collaboration incubator with the goal of establishing "connections" between/among faculty across varied disciplines. These connections enhance faculty engagement and satisfaction by sparking new friendships and areas of scholarly research/artistic activity.

<u>Faculty Development Communities (FDCs)</u> – The purpose of the FDC program is to provide a platform on which like-minded faculty members can work on collaborative projects which can range from pedagogical initiatives, classroom engagement strategies, course design and technologies, research endeavors, social/emotional development, establishing positive workplace/classroom culture, personal growth, and many more.

PD #4: "Unlocking Potential: Applying the Appreciative Advising Theory-to-Practice Framework"

This interactive session introduces the Appreciative Advising framework, a student-centered approach that helps faculty and staff build stronger, strengths-based relationships with students. Participants will explore the six key phases, Disarm, Discover, Dream, Design, Deliver, and Don't Settle, and learn how to create personalized advising strategies that support student success and goal achievement.

PD #5: "Advising for Special Programs (RAD SCI/Nursing)"

This interactive faculty development session explores effective advising strategies for students in Northwestern State University's BSRS, ASN, and BSN programs. Faculty will review curriculum patterns, prerequisite sequences, and clinical progression requirements critical to student success. The session includes an overview of Degree Works, NSULA's advising platform, and its application in tracking academic progress and identifying at-risk students. Attendees will engage in case-based advising scenarios to reinforce common advising questions and decision points. Emphasis will be placed on helping students navigate prerequisite challenges, plan for licensure eligibility, and understand the implications of academic missteps. Faculty will leave with practical tools, updated program insights, and a stronger foundation for supporting students through degree completion.

PD #6: "Talk Saves Lives"

Suicide is a leading cause of death, and we now know that it can be prevented.,Megan Lowe and Christine Ferrell are trained presenters for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention's Talk Saves Lives TM program. As faculty and staff, we can learn to identify the signs and direct students or colleagues to adequate help. Talk Saves Lives is an interactive presentation that covers the general scope of suicide, the research on prevention, and what people can do to fight suicide. Attendees learn the risk factors and warning signs of suicide, and how together we can help prevent it.

PD #7: "Empowering Educators with AI"

This hands-on session introduces faculty and staff to the practical use of artificial intelligence in teaching, research, and academic communication. Participants will explore free, easy-to-use Al tools for generating course content, quizzes, assignments, professional emails, and research summaries. The session will also demonstrate how to build Custom GPTs—personalized Al assistants tailored to specific teaching or research needs—without any programming required. Designed for all experience levels, this workshop offers actionable strategies to enhance productivity and impact across academic roles.

PD #8: "Collaborate and Conquer: Unlocking the Power of OneDrive"
